Presentation on changes in zoning in city of Pittsburgh (30 minutes including Q & A) See presentation (Includes: ADU, Inclusionary Zoning, Parking Requirements, Minimum lot size reform, Fair Housing Amendment personal care homes, women's shelters, drug rehab facilities, assisted living facilities, senior housing, multi-suite residential, interim housing, rental registry and smaller version; Amendment to personal care home, removal of permission for dormitories outside of an EMI and wrap around services.
